

Iwo Jima March 1945 4th Marine Division Cemetery

This picture of 1945 is a reminder of the Memorial Day weekend that there are <u>no WARECS or Ontario County</u> <u>RACES nets SUNDAY</u>. As a history teacher this picture I have never seen before. My brother Bob's, N2MLD SK and a DARC President when we were still in the "bunker," first father-in-law was on Iwo Jima. So I thought of Mel when I saw this picture. Mel passed away many years ago. At least give "good signals" out Memorial Day for those who served and those especially gave their all. I "think" of those veterans I knew who have passed away especially on Memorial Day.

This year I will have to add William "Sam" Space, a Vietnam War veteran to my list of remembrances. Sam is the Father of one of my 7th grade Fairport students, Sharon Space, who I had in my class in 1978-79. I had her sister Carol three years later. Sam was a Marine F-4 Phantom pilot who flew 272 missions in three tours. Some of those missions were from a WW2 Exxex class carrier. (I have not figured out which carrier yet carrier or Marine group, Rich. I asked Sharon to send me more info. Sam was the same time as your tour.) I attended Sam's memorial service Friday May 13th in Fairport. Once we found out we were both veteran's we would harass each other. Hi hi. As a teacher we never get to see the "results" of our labor with students. Sharon is one who has kept in contact with me all these years out of a handful who keep in touch with me.

But Jay, KC2TCM, found a good YouTube on the U.S. Navy's "On The Roof Gang- Pioneers of Radio Intelligence, " which was nicely done by the AWA. I have seen this YouTube and it is excellent. It is about the Station HYPO in Hawaii in WW2.

As I have said before, all this ULTRA and MAGIC decryption done in WW2 is a credit to the analysis who could overcome the shire astronomical mathematical odds breaking the "codes" of the Germans and Japanese. It is a credit of these "democratic" thinking minds to achieve their outcomes. One of the faults of "autocratic" minds is the fear of telling those in control there could be compromise and the different departments not communicating well between other departments for whatever the reason. Remember it was the German Navy <u>only</u> who went to a 4-rotor Enigma thinking they were compromised. It was the cooperation of many intelligence departments that helped TOGETHER to break the German Navy 4-rotor cipher keys which took almost six months.

I realize it is not all "radio" but as we are finding out in the events of the Ukraine there many factors involved in winning a "fight." Mother Nature can be a great help at times when that time maybe the darkest. It is a fact that during the whole time period of WW2, atmospheric HF conditions were the best for communications ever. All the "messages" sent by the enemy and reception of those signals by the good guys was superb. All the "resistance" movements who had only 5-watt tube transmitting equipment, their signals were readily heard. Remember the map I showed showing the distance from HYPO in Hawaii and my Navy NSG (Naval Security Group), who had a listening post in WW2 on the Island of Adak in the Aleutian Chain to monitor the North Pacific Japanese messages. That station was only 800 miles from Japan and was not closed down until 1990s. The Russians in the Ukraine are having problems with their HF and VHF communications. You'll find the YouTube interesting. Unfortunately I'll miss Tris' scones. Hi hi. Thanks, Jay, for your help.

National Hurricane Center Annual Communications Test to be Held on May 28

WX4NHC, the amateur radio station at the National Hurricane Center (NHC) in Miami, Florida, will hold its annual communications test on Saturday, May 28, 2022, from 9 AM to 5 PM EDT (1300 - 2100 UTC).

The event is designed to evaluate WX4NHC's amateur radio equipment and antennas at the headquarters in Florida, and to give operators an opportunity to evaluate their home equipment prior to this year's Atlantic hurricane season, which starts on June 1 and runs through November 30. This event allows ham radio operators worldwide to hone their amateur radio communications skills for times of severe weather.

Brief contacts will be available on many frequencies and modes, as well as the exchange of signal reports and basic weather data with any station in any location.

WX4NHC will be on the air on HF, VHF, UHF, 2- and 30-meter APRS, and Winlink at <u>wx4nhc@winlink.org</u> (subject must contain "//WL2K").

The Hurricane Watch Net 14.325 MHz frequency will be active for most of the test, as will 7.268 MHz, depending on propagation. Depending on man-made noise, the net may move to different frequencies, and

participants can locate the net using one of the DX spotting networks, such as the DX Summit website at <u>www.dxsummit.fi</u>.

There will also be a <u>Voice over Internet Protocol (VoIP) Hurricane Net</u> from 4 - 5 PM EDT, or 2000 - 2100 UTC (*IRLP* Node 9219/*EchoLink* WX-TALK Conference Node 7203).

WX4NHC will make a few contacts on local VHF and UHF repeaters, as well as on Florida's Statewide Amateur Radio Network (SARnet).

QSL cards will be available via Julio Ripoll, WD4R.

FOR FUTURE REFERENCE: Annual Armed Forces Day Cross-Band Exercise


[Editor note: This could be a May 2023 event we could do from the EMO shack. I told my XYL, Jan, I have seen the "postcard" sent her via a MARS mobile CW HF unit at Ft. Devens MD on the cross band day 1965 and relayed to an amateur op. I said I'd would see her in a couple of weeks for leave. This was before I had to report to Shemya. I have to search for that postcard. Yep, Jan kept it.]

The US Department of Defense host the Armed Forces Day (AFD) Cross-Band Test traditionally takes place 1 week earlier then Armed Forces Day the third Saturday in May. The event is open to all radio amateurs.

The AFD Cross-Band Test is two-way communications exercise between military and amateur radio stations, as authorized under FCC Part 97 rules (47 CFR § 97.111), and Department of Defense Instruction 4650.02 which establishes the Military Auxiliary Radio System (MARS). During the exercise, radio amateurs listen for stations on military operating frequencies and transmit on frequencies in adjacent amateur bands.

<u>ARRL The National Association for Amateur Radio</u>[®] has promoted the participation of military and amateur radio stations in the AFD event for more than 50 years. In the August 1950 issue of ARRL's membership journal, <u>QST</u>, it was noted that "232 persons made perfect copy of the 'Greeting to Amateurs' broadcast at 25 w.p.m. over 13 military frequencies and have received a Certificate of Merit signed by the Secretary of Defense, the Honorable Louis Johnson."

There are 24 military stations registered across the United States, including Alaska and Hawaii, that will be participating in the 2022 event. Several of those stations will be using the 60-meter

interoperative channels during this exercise. All operations will be on a not-to-interfere basis, in case there are real-world missions being supported during the event timeframe.

An AFD Secretary of Defense message will also be sent in CW and RTTY, and an AFD message will also be transmitted utilizing the Military Standard (MIL-STD) serial PSK waveform (M110), followed by MIL-STD Wide Shift FSK (850 Hz RTTY), as described in MIL-STD 188-110A/B.

INTERNATIONAL DIGITAL CONTEST

Contest Objective: Amateurs worldwide contact and exchange QSO information with other amateurs using any digital mode (excluding RTTY) that supports the 4-digit Grid Square exchange — attended operation only -- on the 160, 80, 40, 20, 15, 10 and 6 meter bands (Technicians are limited per FCC Rules to the 10 and 6 meter bands). Any station may work any other station. Stations may only be worked once per band, regardless of mode. Automated operation is not permitted -- each claimed contact must include contemporaneous direct initiation by the operator on both sides of the contact.

Dates: First full weekend of June (June 4-5, 2022).

Contest Period: Begins 1800 UTC Saturday, ends 2359 UTC Sunday,

Contest rules are now maintained as a single downloadable document.


Very truthful!
